Enhancing International Collaboration: UNIVEN's Commitment to Comprehensive Internationalisation

From October 21 to 24, 2024, representatives from the University of Venda (UNIVEN) participated in strategic discussions with counterparts from the University Colleges Leuven-Limburg (UCLL) in Belgium and The Hague University of Applied Sciences (THUAS) in the Netherlands. This initiative showcased the transformative potential of international partnerships in education, aimed at fostering collaboration and knowledge exchange. These efforts reflect UNIVEN's steadfast commitment to achieving comprehensive internationalisation.

The UNIVEN delegation included Mr Azwidowi Mukheli, Director of Student Affairs; Adv Eric Nemukula, Director of Legal Services; Mr Thanyani Mphephu, Head of Legal Services; Ms Sephiwe Lubisi, Head of Legal Services; Mr Mfaniseni Mnguni, Chief Clerk Hostel Warden; and Mr Thabo Dikgale, Partnership Officer for International Relations and Partnerships. Together, they brought diverse perspectives essential for addressing institutional objectives and developing mutual growth strategies. The sessions underscored UNIVEN's dedication to broadening its academic and cultural horizons, aligning with its vision to enhance educational quality and global competitiveness.

Key Goals of the Strategic Sessions included: Exploring Partnership Models: Participants evaluated various partnership models in academic exchange, research collaboration, and dual-degree programmes. Enhancing Student and Staff Mobility: The discussions aimed to identify pathways for student exchanges, internship opportunities, and short-term staff visits.

Developing Legal Frameworks for Collaboration: The focus was on establishing clear agreements to safeguard institutional rights, promote mutual benefit, and ensure legal compliance in collaborative projects. Advancing Student Affairs: The teams shared practices and strategies to improve student life, wellness, and academic success.

Throughout the four-day session, discussions encompassed a wide range of topics designed to support sustainable and long-term partnerships.

Focus Areas of the Collaboration were on the following: International Relations and Partnership Development: Representatives explored innovative approaches to building global partnerships. UNIVEN shared its internationalisation strategies, while UCLL and THUAS offered insights from their extensive networks. Topics included co-hosting conferences, collaborative research projects, and curriculum development aimed at enhancing global competencies. A notable outcome was an invitation for UNIVEN to join global scientific networks represented by THUAS.

Student Affairs and Well-being: Sessions on student affairs highlighted the importance of well-being and support services. The teams discussed strategies to improve access to mental health resources, promote inclusivity, and create enriching co-curricular programmes. UNIVEN aimed to adopt best practices observed at UCLL and THUAS, including student-led community initiatives supported by Student Affairs.

Legal Agreements and Compliance: The legal teams collaborated to develop templates for partnership agreements, memoranda of understanding (MoUs), and research contracts. With increasing regulatory demands in higher education, they emphasised risk management, intellectual property rights, and ethical considerations in research, laying a solid legal foundation for future collaborations. Additionally, UNIVEN was granted permission to explore an in-house digital solution for managing contracts.

Green Technology Confucius Institute Expands its Reach in Limpopo

Since its establishment in December 2023, the Green Technology Confucius Institute (GTCI) has made significant strides in promoting Chinese

language education and cultural activities at the University of Venda (UNIVEN). In October 2024, GTCI marked an exciting new chapter

by opening several teaching sites across Limpopo, catering to children, teenagers, and adults in local communities.



New Beginnings at UNIVEN Experimental Kindergarten

On 01 October 2024, GTCI inaugurated a new teaching site at the UNIVEN Experimental Kindergarten. The launch ceremony was attended by key figures including Thabo Dikgale, Partnerships Officer at UNIVEN, Rudzani Mamphweli, Community Engagement Officer, and Prof Grace Ge, Co-Director of GTCI. The initiative introduced Chinese language classes to 40 local children and Kindergarten staff.

Prof Ge expressed her gratitude to UNIVEN Experimental Kindergarten for welcoming GTCI into their educational framework, emphasising the importance of collaboration in enriching children's learning experiences. Thabo Dikgale praised GTCI for its role in strengthening the partnership between UNIVEN and Hubei University of Science and Technology (HBUT), which has broadened access to the Chinese language for local learners.

On 06 October 2024, GTCI held discussions with representatives from the South African Police Service (SAPS) in Limpopo, the Community Policing Forum (CPF), and the Chinese Community and Police Co-operation Center. The focus was on establishing a Chinese language teaching site for police officers in Polokwane.

The meeting concluded with an agreement to create a specialised Chinese language training programme for SAPS officers, aiming to enhance their multilingual capabilities. This initiative will involve 40 selected officers from various police stations in Limpopo, who will participate in comprehensive training sessions designed to improve their communication skills and operational effectiveness.



On 08 October 2024, GTCI launched another teaching site at Marude Secondary School. The ceremony was attended by school officials, including Principal Mr Alex Muthelo, alongside GTCI representatives. This initiative will see 108 Grade 8 learners embark on a journey to learn Chinese, with the programme extending throughout their secondary education.

Prof Ge highlighted the collaboration's significance in enriching language education within the Vhembe District. This partnership aims to enhance cultural exchange and mutual understanding among diverse communities, ultimately fostering a more globally aware and multilingual populace.

UNIVEN prioritises local relevance in its mission, and as the sole Chinese language institution in Limpopo, GTCI is dedicated to benefiting local communities. Looking ahead, GTCI will continue to engage actively with these communities, promoting multilingual education and cultural exchanges. By doing so, it aims to enrich the lives of both UNIVEN students and local communities through language and cultural initiatives, as well as through the transfer of green technology knowledge.

Through these efforts, GTCI is not only enhancing educational opportunities but also fostering a spirit of cooperation and understanding that will contribute to the prosperity and development of the Limpopo region.
